




Some Plays (and Films) about Astronomers

PLAYS ABOUT (OR FEATURING) ASTRONOMERS:

✪ Chemers, Krumholz, and Bierman: ***Birth of Stars***. This experimental play, one of whose authors (Mark Krumholz) is an astronomer, performed at the U. of California, Santa Cruz, has a teenage astronomy prodigy as its protagonist, and deals with her life and her obsession with the lives of stars:

In the 1920s at Tait College, football player Tom Marlowe falls in love with Connie Lane, who is tutoring him so he can pass astronomy and be eligible to play in the big game. The astronomy professor has a role in the madcap plot as well.
